

Community Schools Partnership Initiative Provides Supports to Schools in Manitoba: A Message from the Minister

The Community Schools Partnership Initiative (CSPI) was formally introduced in the January 2005 Funding of Schools announcement. This is an interdepartmental initiative that will serve to complement other neighbourhood-based initiatives and access resources. Initiated to support low socio-economic status communities, this project is targeting 15 schools for a pilot project in 2005-06. Six of the schools receiving funding supports are in the Winnipeg School Division, three are in the remainder of the City of Winnipeg, and six are in the City of Brandon and rural/northern Manitoba.

Based on the SchoolPLUS Community School Framework from Saskatchewan, the Community Schools Partnership Initiative is designed to foster and enhance community education philosophy and practices. The SchoolPLUS Framework provides the comprehensive range of supports and approaches intended to meet the diverse needs of children, youth, and their families. It also provides the basis upon which schools will develop their own responses to meet their specific objectives.

During April 2005, three information sessions were held to inform superintendents, schools, and community agencies of the initiative, and to address any questions prior to the proposal submission deadlines. Schools receiving funding in the first phase of this initiative were chosen based on a process followed by a team of reviewers. Selection of the schools was based on proposals, submitted by school divisions, which indicated a particular school's initiative to develop partnership capacity with parent and community leaders, and representatives from relevant community agencies. By outlining the conditions and needs of the school/community, schools can develop a plan to address them.

Schools indicated their program and resource requirements in their proposals. Areas of focus included: parent and community involvement in school curriculum and educational programs; community use of school facilities; early childhood development programming; extra-curricular programs for children and youth; programs to strengthen neighbourhood and family life; initiatives to promote the coordination and delivery of existing services in the local neighbourhood; development and support of representative community

and school groups including parent councils, resident associations, tenant associations, and issue-based groups; and leadership and professional development training regarding community school partnerships and capacity building.

The first year is a developmental year, with funding provided to build community partnerships and a community school partnership strategic plan. Professional and leadership development training began in the fall of 2005. Manitoba Education, Citizenship and Youth will work with other government departments and community organizations to develop a broad capacity to support community initiatives and develop resources to support the schools.

The Community Schools Partnership Initiative is intended to maximize the involvement of people and organizations in the identification and utilization of community resources, in support of providing the best possible education to students in our schools and communities. It is about making our schools student-ready, as well as expecting our students to be school-ready. It is about developing a community identity, a neighbourhood sense of involvement and spirit, and about achieving successful development and learning outcomes for Manitoba's students.

Handbooks Help Students to Focus on the Future

Manitoba Education, Citizenship and Youth has published three documents to assist students in planning for the future: a career planning handbook, a grad planner, and a career portfolio guide.

Focus on the Future: Career Planning Begins at Home

This handbook is designed for parents of students in Middle Years schools to encourage parents and their children to begin thinking about, and discussing, career exploration. Middle Years is an excellent place to start the career planning journey, as students are developing self-esteem, discovering their many skills, and becoming curious about the world of work.

Many parents want information about how to provide career planning assistance and how to plan for their children's post-secondary education. Parents can be one of the greatest career planning allies for their children if they better understand career development, have more information about resources, and are more aware of the role they can play. *Focus on the Future: Career Planning Begins at Home* provides parents with tools to be

involved in a positive way as their children travel along their journey.

Focus on the Future: Your Grad Planner

Focus on the Future: Your Grad Planner was developed to help Grade 8 and Senior 1 students start a new chapter in their education: high school. The planner helps students learn about the requirements for high school graduation, the importance of career exploration during high school, and ways to pay for their future education. The document also suggests resources to assist students in their planning.

A Self-Managed Career Portfolio Guide

As more people, by both choice and necessity, embrace self-employment, contract work, and consulting work, the ability to demonstrate one's skills and knowledge to prospective employers and



post-secondary institutions becomes crucial for success. *A Self-Managed Career Portfolio Guide* serves as a tool to guide students in achieving success in the challenging world of work. The portfolio turns career development into a dynamic process that

involves students, teachers, and parents.

The Department has also launched the Career Portfolio Certificate, which recognizes students' successful completion of a portfolio.

Future to Discover Pilot Project Launched

Manitoba Education, Citizenship and Youth, in partnership with the Canada Millennium Scholarship Foundation, has launched the Future to Discover Pilot Research Project.

Approximately 1000 Senior 2 students from 21 high schools are participating in the project. For the next three years, half of these students—randomly assigned to a program group—and their parents/guardians will be provided with information about career choices, the benefits of post-secondary education, and the different types of post-secondary education available. The other 500 students, who comprise the comparison group, will also be followed throughout Senior 2 to Senior 4.

Participants will be tracked for one year after graduation to determine the extent to which the programming encouraged them to complete their Senior Years

studies and successfully pursue their choice of post-secondary education.

Six facilitators have been hired to implement the Future to Discover project in a series of after-school workshops. The facilitators will be assisted by post-secondary ambassadors who will share their experience as students in college,

apprenticeship programs, and university programs, and provide positive role models for participants in the project.

Manitoba Moves Forward on Educating for Sustainability

In Manitoba, students, educators, school administrators, custodians, local and national not-for-profit organizations, community volunteers, civil servants, and many others are working together to prepare students to live sustainably on the planet.

Educating for Sustainability (EfS) focuses on preparing individuals to live sustainably, and refers to a process for thinking, teaching, and learning principles for sustainability that include knowledge, values, and attitudes. These principles lead to informed and involved students who have creative decision-making and problem-solving skills; scientific, social, economic, and ecological literacy; and commitment to engage in responsible individual and co-operative actions that lead to a sustainable future.

The following initiatives are examples of what has been happening in Manitoba in 2005 to prepare students to live and contribute positively to the interrelated environmental, economic, and social systems of which they are a part.

Youth Taking Action Forums and Teacher Workshops

Over 260 Middle Years and Senior Years students and teachers from 35 Winnipeg schools joined 35 local businesses, government organizations, and community organizations at a two-day Sustainable Communities: Linking Education to Action Forum, held in Winnipeg on February 15 and March 22, 2005.

Delivered by Learning for a Sustainable Future (a not-for-profit Canadian organization founded in 1991 to incorporate sustainable development education into Canada's education systems), the two-day event was part of a province-wide initiative/partnership to heighten awareness of local sustainability issues, encourage community involvement and partnerships, and empower students to take action.

The first day of the two-day forum was held at the University of Manitoba. Students, educators, and community resource individuals heard inspiring speakers share their views on sustainability. The Honourable Peter Bjornson, Manitoba Minister of Education, Citizenship and Youth, provided greetings and expressed support for the important role that youth play in contributing to a sustainable future through active citizenship. Sierra Noble, a 14-year-old Winnipeg student, fiddler, and Youth Landmine Ambassador for the Manitoba campaign to ban landmines, presented the keynote speech and talked about The Power of One.

While educators were involved in a professional development workshop to provide them with tools and techniques to work with students on action projects focused on sustainability, workshop presenters worked with students to address local social, environmental, and economic issues through skill-building and success story workshops. The workshops focused on topics such as water, waste minimization, food security, climate change, community economic development, and other related issues.

2005 Manitoba Envirothon

Another successful Manitoba Envirothon competition was held May 12-14, 2005, at the University of Manitoba. Teams from as far north as Norway House and Thompson joined teams from Swan River, Gimli, Brandon, Portage la Prairie, and Winnipeg. Students and advisors participated in the program and competed in the pre-competition workshop at Lower Fort Garry, and the competition at the University of Manitoba and King's Park.

The Manitoba Envirothon is an educational program that increases students' awareness of the environment, ecosystems, and the natural balance and complexity of these ecosystems. The program promotes team learning and study methods; provides students with an opportunity to travel and experience different views on environmental issues, concerns, and concepts; and provides educators with a new and exciting addition to their science, social studies,

geography, current affairs, and environmental studies curricula. The project was supported by 40 companies, government departments, and individuals. Seventy-eight volunteers from a wide range of groups, organizations, and government departments, and Manitoba Forestry Association staff, were responsible for all aspects of the planning and delivery, including logistics, trail testing, communications, and fundraising.

After the first day, students and educators began working together on the development of action plans to address sustainability issues. This activity prepared them for the second day of the forum (March 22), which provided more opportunities for students to hear inspiring stories about students making a difference, individually and collectively, in enhancing environmental, economic, and social factors. Students, educators, and workshop presenters continued the development of action plans for implementation in Manitoba schools and communities in 2005-06 and beyond.

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Four Manitoba Schools Receive UNESCO Designation

The United Nations Educational, Scientific and Cultural Organization (UNESCO) has officially designated four Manitoba schools as UNESCO-associated schools, following three years in the Associated Schools Project Network (ASPnet). Established in 1953, ASPnet is a global network of more than 7000 schools (and teacher training institutions) in over 170 countries around the world.

The four schools include Brock Corydon, John Pritchard, Institut collégial Vincent Massey, and Collège Jeanne-Sauvé. River East Collegiate was also recognized as an ASPnet candidate school.

ASPnet promotes peace through local, national, and international partnerships in the areas of human rights, democracy and tolerance, intercultural learning, and environmental issues. Sustainable development was the overarching focus, wherein students and teachers learned about environmental, economic, and social perspectives. Manitoba's spokespeople for ASPnet include Fred Penner, Al Simmons, and educator Gareth Neufeld.

Energy Efficiency: Power Smart Energy Manager Project

The Power Smart Energy Manager (PSEM) project was established in August 2001 as a unique two-year pilot project between the Pembina Trails School Division and Manitoba Hydro through the Power Smart Department.

It was anticipated that a significant reduction in annual facility utility costs could be achieved through the project. A variety of energy-related curriculum support materials were prepared and made available to teachers to increase student awareness about energy efficiency and responsible use of resources. Staff-development materials, including “Energy Efficient Best Practices in the Workplace” and “A Culture of Energy Efficiency in the Workplace” were also prepared and made available to teaching staff and custodial personnel in all facilities.

Recommendations for changes in systems operating procedures were developed, and opportunities to increase resource efficiencies were identified and incorporated into site-specific Resource Efficiency Plans. Retrofitting of classroom and gymnasium lighting systems, upgrading of HVAC control

systems, and modification of water fixtures in student washrooms were major initiatives of the project.

The total expenditures over a four-year period are estimated at \$465,000. The total annual utility costs for water and sewage, electricity, and natural gas were reduced by more than \$37,000 by the end of the first year of the project. By the end of the second year, annual utility costs were reduced by \$113,000, and by the end of the third year, annual utility costs had been reduced by \$224,000, for a total “avoided costs” in the amount of \$375,000 over a three-year period. Based on these data, projected savings over a ten-year period are estimated to be in excess of \$1,750,000.

In addition to the fiscal reductions, there is evidence that attitudes of staff and students to energy and resource usage have changed significantly. In June 2003, the project was extended for an additional two-year period to permit implementation in all sites within the new Pembina Trails School Division. The PSEM project now involves a total of 13,000 students and some 1400 staff. The project extension was adapted to provide additional focus on the relationship between climate change, greenhouse gas emissions, sustainable development, and inefficient energy usage.

A Handbook of Power Smart Energy Efficiency Learning Resources has been distributed by Manitoba Education, Citizenship and Youth as a support document to the Interdisciplinary Middle Years Multimedia unit entitled *Inventions, Innovations, and Discoveries: A Grade 6 Interdisciplinary Middle Years (IMYM) Unit for Teachers*. As well, the Honourable Tim Sale, former Minister of Energy, Science and Technology, recognized the value and efficacy of this program and announced in December 2003 that an initiative modelled on the PSEM concept could be extended to all school divisions in the province through a new government efficiency agency. Since then, the agency has been under development in conjunction with Manitoba Hydro and other important partners, and an announcement on its launch is expected this year.

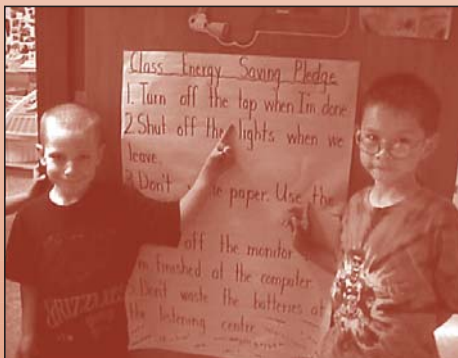

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Building Design Standards Manual

Energy management and alternative energy sources are of growing interest in the building industry. A number of environmentally friendly, energy-efficient features will be incorporated into the design of new



schools. The Public Schools Finance Board (PSFB) is formulating a *Building Design Standards Manual* to describe in more detail the technical aspects of the schools it funds. The scope of the design manual will include “green building” parameters such as environmental and energy stewardship, durability, sustainability, suitable siting guidelines, improved indoor environmental conditions, and integrated design process. PSFB is considering the adoption of LEEDS certification (Leadership in Energy and Environmental Design) standards for new schools.

Our Community School

The Cree name *Wapanohk* means “in the eastern direction from where the sun rises.” It can also mean “a new dawn or day” and “a new beginning.” It refers to renewal and change. The people of Wapanohk Community School have begun this journey towards making a real difference in the way education is being carried out here in Thompson, Manitoba.

A community school not only takes responsibility for educational aspects of its students, but also incorporates initiatives regarding the social, recreational, cultural, judicial, and health aspects of students and their families.

Wapanohk Community School has been able to increase the role of community in a meaningful way by embracing parent and community involvement and partnerships.

Wapanohk Community School (WCS) opened its doors in September 2001 to the first dual-track Cree language and community school in northern Manitoba. At the time of the school's inception, the First Nations community in Thompson was concerned that there

were significant gaps within the educational system that needed to be addressed. Two major community surveys and a comprehensive needs assessment were completed to determine whether or not a community school with Cree language programming was seen as a necessity in Thompson. Approximately 85 per cent of the Aboriginal respondents were in favour of the development of such a school. A review of the school population at that time indicated a high rate of single-parent families, a large number of parents who were post-secondary students, poor social-support networks, and low socio-economic conditions of the families served in the school's catchment area.

Now in its fourth year of implementation, WCS has been able to increase the role of community in a

meaningful way by embracing parent and community involvement and partnerships. Partnerships currently exist with 18 community organizations working with the school for students and families. The school serves as a networking hub with these many organizations to foster the social, health, educational, and community well-being and capacity building of the parents and children we serve.

Throughout the past four years WCS has provided many extra-curricular activities in the areas of music, sport, art, culture, and social development. There is a full-time community school connector (Loretta Dykun) who develops parent and family programming. The current parent council is vibrant, strong, and energetic. The healthy snack program for Kindergarten to Grade 4 students is one of many parent council initiatives, and plans for a daily nutritious breakfast program are in the works.

This past year WCS ran a new program entitled FAST (Families and Schools Together). The program was very successful, and 11 families graduated. Parent graduates and their families will now be involved in the two-year FASTWORKS follow-up program.

Results from surveys conducted throughout this past year reveal that we are making significant progress towards our targets regarding parent involvement. Recently, 94 per cent of parents surveyed said that they were “proud to be Wapanohk parents.”

Wapanohk Community School is well on its way to building a “Community of Hope” here in the northern Manitoba community of Thompson.
