Are all students who apply to take the course required to complete the 40-hour practicum placement?

Yes. Schools may consider developing a student suitability guideline similar to those of work and communitybased program placements. In addition, consider the number of practicum placement sites available when determining your enrolment. Please refer to FAQ Applied Family Studies: Required 40-Hour Practicum Information.

What is expected of the student during the practicum experience?

A number of general learning outcomes (GLOs) and specific learning outcomes (SLOs) within Goal 5 relate to the practicum experience (pages 14 to 18). GLOs 5.1 to 5.5 are to be integrated throughout the applied family studies course and are not intended to be a unit of study. The practicum experience must meet the specific learning outcomes in GLOs 5.6 to 5.8.

When are the practicum hours completed?

The framework of outcomes allows for the hands-on practicum experience to be completed during the school day within the scheduled class time. This full-credit course provides 70 hours of classroom instruction and 40 hours for the practicum. Decisions related to practicum hours outside of the school day or course time are at the discretion of the school/applied family studies teacher.

Does the applied family studies teacher have to check on the students at the placements?

Yes. The framework of outcomes states, "Students must be visited by the teacher and/or school designate* at the practicum site regularly" (GLO 5.6, page 16).

^{*} A school designate must hold a Manitoba teacher's certificate and have knowledge of the course content/practicum learning outcomes and of early childhood development.



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When does the school teacher/designate* visit students?

Typically, the practicum experience takes place during class time, which provides the teacher and/or designate with the time to visit the student. There may be more than one student placed at a site or the child care facilities may be in close proximity to each other to allow for two to three site visits during the scheduled time.

Where are the teacher support resources for applied family studies?

Teachers are encouraged to source support materials from a number of areas such as the following:
