At the turn of the century, farm families from Europe swarmed to Canada. By 1900, there were 27,000 Ukrainians homesteading on the Prairies, people of the steppes who knew how to farm far from water; "stalwart peasants in sheepskin coats," Clifford Sifton called them. The population of Manitoba rose to 225,000 by 1901, and ten years later was almost doubled that in number...

Passengers packed colonist cars and wheat overflowed freight trains. Railway construction added to the economic boom. . The Canadian Northern received guarantees [government loans] and the Grand Trunk got cash for a span from Winnipeq to Moncton, New Brunswick. . .

A shrewd Methodist, Timothy Eaton, sent illustrated mail-order catalogues to westerners who spoke no English, and grew rich selling bicycles and stoves from coast to coast...

The longest reign in British history ended when Queen Victoria died in 1901. Her 60-year-old son became Edward VII. His coronation parade passed under Canada's gift, an arch of prairie wheat costing \$33,000 inscribed BRITAIN'S GRANARY. Canada's immigration office in Charing Cross Road [London] helped recruit 65,000 British farmers in a five-year period.
