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INTRODUCTION

Every day across Manitoba, skilled and dedicated teachers, staff, and school leaders support quality education and improve student outcomes through innovation. Manitoba's Teachers' Idea Fund is a five-year, \$25 million investment in the ideas and innovations of front-line teachers, staff, and school leaders from across our province. Proposals must meet specific criteria and are submitted by educators with the endorsement of the qualifying school and school division authority. The applications are reviewed with input and advice from the Teachers' Idea Fund Review Panel, which is composed of diverse specialists from post-secondary institutions, the innovation sector, industry and business, government, and Kindergarten to Grade 12 education.

This report is a snapshot in time that celebrates promising projects and project results that have been accomplished across the Kindergarten to Grade 12 education system during the first year of the fund's implementation. Year one projects (2021/2022) highlighted positive outcomes such as improvements in attendance and engagement, numeracy and literacy, and mental health and well-being. These were accomplished through targeted learning supports, as well as models of teaching and learning, mental health and well-being, parent and family engagement, and transitions in Kindergarten to Grade 12 education. Year two projects (2022/2023) have an emphasis on mental health and well-being, including initiatives that focus on social and emotional learning, and provide enhanced mental health resources and support for students.

Since the launch of the fund in 2021, \$11 million has been committed to 162 projects to date. Ongoing partnerships and strong collaboration with and between schools are fostering opportunities to promote inclusion and learning to help students reach their full potential, regardless of their background, personal circumstances, or location.


REGIONAL BREAKDOWN

OUTCOMES TO DATE

The following are some highlights from the 2021/2022 Teachers' Idea Fund.

Targeted Learning Supports

- Improving instructional strategies for the English language arts curriculum
- Increasing Early Years students' speech and language skills
- Introducing a structured literacy approach and grade-level book clubs and story bags.
- Increasing French Immersion opportunities
- Addressing academic and mental health impacts related to COVID-19
- Providing students with hands-on, experiential learning opportunities (e.g., developing short films for a student film festival, working with experts to design an outdoor learning space, taking part in career development activities including entrepreneurial and apprenticeship opportunities)

Models of Teaching and Learning

- Deepening students' understanding of Indigenous cultures, languages, imagery, traditional knowledge, and contemporary lifestyles through the introduction of Elders, land-based learning, and cultural exploration
- Building educator capacity in supporting improvement in student literacy and numeracy skills, including the development and/or enhancement of professional learning communities and teaching sprints to improve teacher practice
- Supporting students with diverse learning needs through tools and enhanced programing to improve their school experience
- Enhancing students' well-being through the introduction and/or enhancement of supportive programming in the arts and extracurricular activities
- Developing students' creativity for new ideas and experimenting with their innovations during STEAM (science, technology, engineering, art, and math) and STEM (science, technology, engineering, and math) lessons

Mental Health and Well-Being

- Taking learning outdoors to explore and connect with nature
- Practising mindfulness so that students learn skills to reduce their own stress/anxiety and increase their focus
- Increasing student belonging through deeper connections to culture, the school community, and their peers
- Providing more supports for students to seek out help when struggling with mental health
- Increasing students' self-efficacy in school and developing coping skills in students who are overwhelmed by social and emotional situations

Transitions in K to 12 Education

- Improving students' attendance, grades, and credit achievement by strengthening relationships and reducing barriers
- Preparing students to transition from high school to post-secondary or the workforce with jobready skills
- Increasing student engagement in school and community settings
- Increasing self-regulation skills in students to support successful transitions

Engage Families and Parents

- Implementing community and peer connections that instill a strong sense of belonging within the school
- Improving literacy by increasing home and school connections
- Improving attendance through before-, during-, and after-school supports and programming that increase connections with families and parents/caregivers
- Fostering awareness and positive parental/caregiver supports and engagement in school

TEACHERS' IDEA FUND PROMISING PROJECTS **SPOTLIGHT**

The following four projects are samples of the exciting innovative projects that have the potential to be scaled up in similar situations when adapted to fit local needs.

Innovation in education is the implementation of new, improved, or scaled-up locally driven initiatives that produce a significant change in teaching and learning, leading to improved student outcomes.

These projects showcase who has been affected by a project, as well as the notable accomplishments that lead to meaningful change that have been observed in the implementation process. This data, which was captured in the August 2022 project reports, is obtained through quantifiable and/or observational outcomes recorded by the project team while implementing the project. This information aims to offer a sample of the innovative, promising projects the Teachers' Idea Fund has provided funding for, but it is only a glimpse into the many strong projects being implemented across Manitoba.

Supporting land-based learning for Early Years students at Juniper School in the School District of Mystery Lake (\$14K—1 year: 2021/2022)

Juniper School is taking a land-based approach to strengthen and target math and English language arts outcomes among Kindergarten to Grade 2 students. The project hosts camp days and uses traditional land-based teachings with a northern and Indigenous lens to reinforce math and language skills. By integrating core subject areas with traditional land-based practices and ways of knowing, the project increased engagement and positive student achievement and well-being in students. The teaching team has been modelling lessons using a natural progression of learning through exploration and deeper connections.

IMPACTS

To date, the project has had an impact on 88 students—including 84 per cent Indigenous and 13 per cent with special learning needs—in Kindergarten to Grade 2 across multiple classrooms and over 20 teachers, staff, and community members.

GOALS

 To strengthen math and English language arts outcomes for their respective grade levels

OUTCOMES

- For the Kindergarten class, teachers reported 0 per cent of students at grade level in literacy outcomes at the beginning of the project and 65 per cent of students at grade level by the end of the project.
- For the Kindergarten class, teachers reported 8.5 per cent of students at grade level in numeracy outcomes at the beginning of the project and 77 per cent of students at grade level by the end of the project.
- In Grades 1/2, 57 per cent of students gained two or more reading levels throughout the year and 22 per cent of students now read at grade level or above.
- In Grades 1/2, 72 per cent of students showed growth in math this year, including 87 per cent of students attaining a Grade 1 or more in math assessment, with 91 per cent of students beginning the school year below grade level in math assessment.

Increasing attendance and engagement of Grade 12 students at the Roving Campus at Portage Collegiate Institute in Portage la Prairie School Division (\$25K—1 year: 2021/2022)

The Roving Campus is a school-within-a-school for Grades 11 and 12 students who have not been attending class. The mission of the campus is to make learning engaging and relevant to students who have been "non-attenders" and at risk of not graduating by providing an alternative pathway to a high school diploma, employability skills, and certification. Students spend the majority of time outside the classroom and are offered different hands-on and experiential learning opportunities.

The teachers focus on improving attendance by forming meaningful relationships with students and their families, and on providing the needed support for students to thrive in the classroom and their communities. The Roving Campus has also formed partnerships with local businesses and community organizations to improve student well-being and success. The Teachers' Idea Fund supported the second year of the program.

IMPACTS

To date, the project has had an impact on 45 students including 70 per cent Indigenous, 4 per cent French language, and 26 per cent with special learning needs—in Grades 11 and 12 across five schools. six classrooms, five teachers, and all administrators and student services teams in the division.

GOALS

- Improve student attendance of the Grades 11 and 12 students
- Improve grades and credit achievement
- Improve social-emotional well-being

OUTCOMES

- Excluding COVID-19-related isolation absences, the campus has achieved a 44 per cent average improvement in attendance among Grades 11 and 12 students, going from 23 per cent to 67 per cent in students that joined the program.
- After joining the Roving Campus, 91 per cent of the students have achieved the number of credits required to graduate or to move forward to the next grade level.
- Of those students who had significant behaviour interventions, reports show that after joining the Roving Campus 100 per cent of students with behaviour interventions are showing an improvement.

Digitized library of multilingual and multicultural books for Kindergarten to Grade 8 students and families at Linden Meadows School in Pembina Trails School Division (\$12K—1 year: 2021/2022)

Linden Meadows School is collaborating with students and families in creating a digitized classroom library of multilingual and multicultural narratives for Kindergarten to Grade 8 students with the goal of improving student literacy outcomes. These narratives will help the school staff become more aware of their students' true identities and gain a better understanding of the complex world in which they reside, thereby creating a strong bridge between home and school.

The project captured and showcased student and classroom narratives and celebrated them with school staff, students, and families. It was a forum for students to have a voice and share their stories with families and friends, and for families to feel connected to their child's learning journey. In times of disrupted school-to-home connections, this project is helping to bridge the gap.

IMPACTS

The project has had an impact on 509 students—including 10 per cent Indigenous, 46 per cent newcomer, and 12 per cent with special learning needs—in Grades 1, 2, and 3 across 11 classrooms and 25 teachers/staff members.

GOALS

 To create, monitor, and track classroom and student narratives using Book Creator digital books and classroom libraries

OUTCOMES

- At the beginning of the school year, six classroom teachers showed interest in participating in this project. By June 2022, all classroom teachers participated in the project.
- Student involvement grew from involvement in six classrooms to all 509 students in the school, including Kindergarten to Grade 8 classrooms.
- Throughout the project implementation, 310 books have been created for a variety of functions, including student/classroom showcases and virtual tours for newcomer/English-as-an-additional-language families. Students can see their work in the library and access their teacher's and classroom's books to read at home and in the classroom.
- Students are showing increased literacy levels. When students are highly engaged and motivated to create narratives for these books, their language stages and literacy levels (in reading, writing, listening, and speaking) have increased during the course of this project.

Creating joyful readers through home, school, and community partnerships in Early Years at Dufferin School in Winnipeg School Division (\$100K/year—2 years)

Dufferin School teachers moved from an intervention-style model of teaching to inquiry-based reading and writing and using teacher inquiry that supports their young readers. The "Creating Joyful Readers" team has grounded their professional learning and literacy practices in empirical, theoretical, and pedagogical research, along with evidence-based teacher practitioner resources and self-regulation research.

The project is re-imagining and re-invigorating literacy teaching and learning at Dufferin School. They have enhanced several classroom libraries through the purchase of high-engagement and diversity-focused books that reflect the lived experiences of their students. Teachers have engaged in intensive professional learning, becoming critical friends for one another as they try and examine new pedagogical approaches, resources, and assessments for/as/of student learning. The goal is to improve student literacy outcomes by building teacher capacity, structuring classrooms and resources to best fit the needs of learners, and improving school-home connections.

IMPACTS

The project has had an impact on 100 students—including 42 per cent Indigenous, 17 per cent newcomer, and 2 per cent with special learning needs—in Grades 1, 2, 3, and 5/6 across 11 classrooms and 25 teachers/staff members.

GOALS

- Students see themselves as readers and develop a positive attitude to reading within school.
- Students recognize the importance of choosing texts of appropriate complexity and high interest/ engagement/joy so they can apply strategies they are learning within school and at home.

OUTCOMES

- Teachers reported a 100 per cent increase in their students' frequency in picking up books throughout the school day, as well as an increased interest in taking books home to read with family.
- Teachers also reported increased quality and quantity of books available in classrooms.
- Students reported that they saw themselves as readers (87 per cent this term).
- Approximately 75 per cent of students directly involved in this project showed increased engagement in their choice of texts.
- All of the teachers observed an increase in joy in the classroom and took an active role in designing their classroom environment to actively facilitate increasing joy and engagement in learners.
- There was an observation that educators involved are shifting to see themselves as teacherresearchers, systematically documenting their own inquiries into their pedagogical practices with literacy learning.
- Teachers are reporting feeling greater confidence in choosing pedagogical approaches that best fit their students' needs and interests.

GOALS FOR YEAR 2

In 2022/2023, the following intended outcomes will progress:

- Design and adapt classrooms to create intentional micro spaces for joyful, comfortable, inviting reading spaces at school.
- Increase teachers' sense of efficacy in their own literacy teaching through professional learning and collaborative, critical friendships through professional learning communities and self-study practices.
- Cultivate reciprocal partnerships among school, families, and community that foster a love of reading.

CONCLUSION

Teachers' Idea Fund projects are furthering the goals of Manitoba's K to 12 Education Action Plan, Mamàhtawisiwin: The Wonder We Are Born With—An Indigenous Education Policy Framework, and Manitoba's Framework for Learning, ensuring high-quality learning and that students reach their full potential.

The innovative ideas put forth and implemented by educators, school leaders, and staff are improving attendance and engagement, literacy and numeracy, inclusion, and mental health in schools. The reach of the projects is supported by both qualitative and quantitative data provided by project leads in the Kindergarten to Grade 12 education system who have shared their successes and lessons learned with colleagues and their communities.

COVID-19 disruptions created some implementation challenges during the 2021/2022 school year. We would like to acknowledge the ingenuity and hard work project teams put into their project implementation to overcome these challenges and achieve outstanding results.

As 2022/2023 projects are implemented, the focus on mental health and well-being for students and educators will be highlighted and reported on.
